If applied incorrectly, HVM measures can be resource intensive, costly and disrupt operations. 'The Australia-New Zealand Counter-Terrorism Committee (ANZCTC) Strategy for Protecting Crowded Places from Terrorism' states, "specialist advice is essential ... and careful consideration and planning is required" before implementing any HVM treatments.

Our analysis provides clients with the confidence to mitigate vehicle risk, applying a locally-focussed, proportionate strategy that is sympathetic to a site's functionality and sense of place. We take a 'security and safety by design' approach which considers:

- Operational requirements of the site/event owner
- · Site-specific threat and risk context

- Vehicle dynamics assessment to guide the selection of both rated and non-rated vehicle impact security barriers
